Can I be real with you? It was scary when I decided to leave my position as Campus Director at National College in December 2011 to start Community Christian Academy. I had talked to a variety of people over several months and gotten comments such as, "You can't run a Christian school where tuition pays only 30% of your budget." "The economy is bad; people don't have the funds to support another ministry." "There's not enough money in Charlottesville to pay for another school." And the one that struck most deeply, "I don't want to see you hurt and embarrassed if it fails."

I did get some, "That's nice; I hope it works out for you." That's the polite way of saying, "I think you're crazy, but I'm too polite to say so to your face." And a handful reminded me, "God can do anything; if He says do it, then go for it!" Some of those few be-

came my board members, financial supporters, and prayer partners.

Community Christian Academy is a faith ministry. God called a director with few financial resources to partner with some



people with few resources to serve children where many of their families have few financial resources. While you are probably thinking that I'm getting ready to ask for donations, I'm not (because I am a terrible fundraiser). Instead, can I take a minute to brag on my God?

When we had nothing to give to secure a facility for the school and only three days left to submit an application to Albemarle

County for a special use permit, God gave us a home at Alliance Bible Church (now called Cross-Life Community Church) on Rio Road. This place was perfect for a school and already came filled with books, furniture, art supplies, and more. We thought that since we were offering affordable tuition rates with a sliding scale tuition model that we would have people clamoring to get in and would be full with 60 kids. However, by June, we had only 7 students and no funds to hire any teachers. It's hard to believe now, but we considered waiting a year to open in hopes of raising the needed funds to operate.

The Board and I spent a few weeks seeking God's will, and I felt that the Lord was challenging us to see a difference between a rough road and an impasse. Since we didn't have the funds or

enough students to bring in enough tuition dollars to pay for classroom teachers, we asked our top two candidates if they would walk in faith with us and agree to serve even if funds did not come in to pay them. After discussing the situation with their spouses, both teachers came back with the same responses. “I am called by God to be here. Even though I can’t afford not to be paid, God will take care of my needs.” Wow, what faith! In addition to our two classroom teachers, the Lord brought ten volunteers (some of whom we highlighted in last month’s newsletter) to provide extra-curricular activities (such as Spanish and music), office support, after-care supervision, classroom help, and janitorial services. With teachers, helpers, a facility, supplies, and eleven students, we were ready to start.

Living by faith is exciting, but it is also really hard. As expected, we did not have the funds from tuition to pay our teachers in September. Our school’s prayer team was in operation, and for a week, we prayed that God would bring in the funds to make payroll. Checks had to be written on a Friday, and the Monday before, we were \$2,500 short—the amount we had anticipated. It was exciting to watch as for four straight days, God brought in donations that ended up being enough to make payroll! Then, we prayed for rent, which was an additional \$1,000 needed in two weeks. Again, God provided just in time. When we

closed the books at the end of September, every bill had been paid in full without my asking any specific person for a donation.

October started out just



like September with a \$2,500 need for payroll. As I prayed about it, I didn’t feel concerned like I did last month because I had seen God’s faithful provision in September. However, this month, God didn’t bring the funds needed for payroll. After payday on the 15th, God did bring the exact amounts needed for our remaining monthly bills, so exact, in fact, that the difference between our bills and income was only \$6! However, I didn’t know what to think about having only half the funds needed to pay the teachers.

The week after payday, I was somewhat quiet during my daily prayer time in the sanctuary at school. (I get alone with God in the sanctuary every school day for a 30-minute time of intercession for our ministry.) Normally, I pace before the altar, praying out loud, but that week I sat in the pew with a huge “question mark” in my spirit. Had God failed to show up? Did I not have enough faith this month? What would I say to all those people who

said that we couldn’t possibly run a school that relied on 70% of income from donations? To make matters worse, I had to figure out how our circumstances made sense in light of Ephesians 3:20 (see quote to the left). That verse had chased me the whole week before payroll—on the radio, in my pastor’s Sunday sermon—I just couldn’t get away from it.

I can’t say that God in a booming voice came to me in my quiet time and cleared everything up, but some thoughts did come to mind over the next few days that may be part of the answer.

1. The cross appeared to be the greatest defeat of all history until the resurrection proved otherwise. (Perhaps failing to make payroll is part of God’s bigger plan.)

2. A community school that serves all people regardless of ability to pay needs support throughout the community. (If people see that God fully provides through a few people, they will assume that someone else will help and will not participate.)

3. Faith untested isn’t faith. Like Job, our resolve must be tested.

I can’t guarantee that these ideas are from God, but I do know that our teachers came to work after being paid half their salary with the same commitment and joy as they did the day before. The road of faith is rough, but we continue to move forward because we are not at an impasse.

I Have the Best Job Ever— And You Can't Change My Mind

I love my job. I get to work with light, tan, and dark-skinned children from poor, middle-income, and upper-income families who worship Jesus in Presbyterian, Baptist, Pentecostal, non-denominational churches—or maybe only at school. We read, add, speak Spanish, sing, spell, experiment, play, pray, and occasionally cry together. We invade each other's spaces (see the pictures on the previous pages where we are cramped in my office celebrating my birthday with child-made birthday

cards.) We are a community, and we are making a difference.

The birthday card below was made for me by one of



our students who has had a "talk" with me before—nothing serious. He has a quality character, and I'm glad I'm one of many who

get to help guide his way. His birthday card was extra special to me because it touched a topic I'm so passionate about—faith, and he noted that faith was in our school.

I once heard a Christian singer be introduced as someone who had given up her singing career to sing for Jesus—that's ridiculous. I don't think you give up anything to serve Jesus. I left rat race to help raise children who will be strong academically and who will love Jesus. It just doesn't get any better than this!
